### Summary Report Received from 20th PRCP 2023 Organizing Committee

The 20th International Congress of the Pacific Rim College of Psychiatrist brought together mental health professionals from all over the world, from the most part of Asia Pacific to the vibrant city of Kuala Lumpur from 13th to 15th October 2023. The Pacific Rim College of Psychiatrist (PRCP) and Malaysian Psychiatric Association (MPA) organized the congress.

The theme of the congress was 'Building Mental Health Resilience Across the Lifespan'. People's mental health has been affected by the COVID-19 pandemic's unparalleled disruption. It also effectively conveyed the crux of global difficulties affecting humanity specifically in Asia Pacific. The congress focused on mental health experts exchanging ideas about assisting the community in rebuilding and strengthening resilience to address these critical challenges impact on mental health.

Renowned speakers from around the world imparted their knowledge and research findings over the course of three days. Experts addressed the audience with cutting-edge insights and current understanding of mental health. Delegates contributed by sharing their experiences and points of view at the several planned symposiums.

To not forget, President of PRCP, Prof Chee Ng (2021 -2023) for his confidence and assistance throughout the congress planning process towards the Malaysian Psychiatric Association. The President of Malaysian Psychiatric Association, Prof Ahmad Hatim Sulaiman played a crucial role for the significant triumph of the congress as the Organising Chairman. Recognizing the local Scientific Committee Chairperson, Dr Aili Hanim Hashim and Treasurer of the Congress, Prof Ng Chong Guan are of utmost significance.

Over 473 delegates from over 20 countries attended this hybrid conference both virtually and in person. Two PRCP Past Presidents, Prof Helen Herrman and Prof Mian Yoon Chong were in attendance as well. Over the three days, there were a total of 16 Plenary Lectures, 3 Special Lectures, 23 Symposiums, 16 Oral Presentations and 37 E-Poster Presentations.

International delegates were cordially invited to explore Kuala Lumpur and other Malaysian cities during this visit. Kuala Lumpur prides itself on its well-developed infrastructure and diverse array of attractions, including historical and contemporary landmarks, as well as delectable cuisine. It is a multicultural



metropolis, emblematic of the multifaceted nature of Malaysia. Delegates have the privilege of attending the conference while simultaneously immersing themselves in the cultural, gastronomic, and visual delights of Kuala Lumpur and Malaysia.

The congress was the perfect opportunity and ideal occasion to reestablish contacts with colleagues while also forming new connections and interacting with international professionals in mental health.

#### Report at the 2023 PRCP General Assembly on Oct 15, 2023

#### The 20th Pacific Rim College of Psychiatrists (PRCP) Congress

The 20th PRCP Congress was held at the Hilton Kuala Lumpur in conjunction with the 27th Malaysian Conference of Psychological Medicine (MCPM). Foremost, I would like to congratulate the Local Organising Committee of the PRCP Congress and MCPM for preparing a highly successful congress attended by over 470 participants on-site and 70 online participants. The Congress was very privileged to have an impressive range of eminent speakers featured in 16 plenaries, 3 special lectures, as well as 21 symposia, 16 oral presentations and 35 e-posters. Special thanks to the local organizing committee Chair: Prof Ahmad Hatim, Co-Chair Dr. Mohd Fadzli Isa, Treasurer: Prof Ng Chong Guan, Secretary, and Scientific Committee Chair, Dr Aili Hanim, and her highly capable team, all the local and international committee members, all the plenary and symposium presenters, and the sponsors for their support.

#### **Key PRCP Activities:**

The PRCP Journal, Asia-Pacific Psychiatry has grown to be a leading academic journal in the region. According to the released 2022 Impact Factors, Asia-Pacific Psychiatry's Impact Factor is 3.5, a decrease from its previous year of 3.78. However, our ranking has improved from last year to 60/144 from 64/142 in the Social Science Citation Index category.

One of the flagship training activities of the PRCP in the last 2 years has been the Asia-Pacific Regional E-Training (APRE). In 2021 the APRE training included 10 online sessions on the "Introduction to Mental Health and Psychosocial Support (MPSS) Telehealth" which provided information, resources, and opportunity to explore clinical practice in using digital health tools to provide mental health care. This was followed by with a series of three workshops in 2022, with international speakers, information, global and local resources, for Cambodia mental health professionals to explore best practice guidelines for Cambodian mental health practice. The key stakeholder included Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse,



Ministry of Health Cambodia with training partners from Australia, Canada, New Zealand, Singapore, and the NGO sector.

PRCP has been also actively engaged with inter-organisational collaboration with several peak psychiatric organisations globally. These included World Psychiatric Association (WPA), Asian Federation of Psychiatric Association (AFPA), Royal Australian and New Zealand College of Psychiatrists (RANCZP), Japanese Society of Psychiatry and Neurology (JSPN), Korean Neuropsychiatric Association (KNPA), Malaysian Psychiatric Association (MPA), Indonesian Psychiatric Association (IPA), and others.

#### **Future Meeting:**

I am delighted to announce that the 21st PRCP Congress will be held in Tokyo in 2025. For the first time, the PRCP Congress will be held jointly with the World Association of Cultural Psychiatry (WACP). We look forward to seeing all PRCP members and other colleagues at this excellent congress in Japan, and we hope that your participation will enrich the academic and cultural exchange among colleagues from the Pacific Rim region and other parts of the globe.

### 7. Asia Pacific Psychiatry Journal report

Dear Colleagues,

It has been a great honor and intellectual pleasure to serve as Editor in Chief of our journal. It is a role that I never expected to hold when I formulated the plan to implement the journal when I was PRCP President Elect back in the early 2000's. Major thanks go to EH Kua and Ed Chiu who served as the first editors. Their foundational work ensured the ongoing success of the journal. Fate, however, does have a way of intervening in our plans, and this year marks the tenth year of my tenure as Editor in Chief.



I have been very gratified by the progress of the journal, and I will review some of what I believe are the most important accomplishments. Before doing that, however, I'd like to announce that this tenth year mark of my tenure is an appropriate time for me to transition to the role of Emeritus Editor in Chief, and to turn over active leadership to another person at the end of this calendar year. While our formal process is that the Editor in Chief has the responsibility and authority to appoint other members of the editorial leadership, including any deputy or associate editors, the members of the editorial board, and reviewers, the PRCP Board has the authority to appoint the Editor in Chief. It is my strongest possible recommendation that the Board appoint Chee Ng as the next editor in chief. He has performed exceptionally well in all responsibilities as Deputy Editor for a number of years. He easily meets the standards for excellence in every aspect of importance for service as the Editor in Chief.

I have attached <u>the annual publication report</u> from our publisher, Wiley, which reviews another very successful year for the journal. I'd like to highlight just a few points from that report plus some other topics from the years of my tenure:

1 My original concept for the journal was that it would serve as an English language international journal which could provide an intermediate level of publication opportunity between national language country or region centered articles, and some of the most competitive international journals such as the American Journal of Psychiatry or the British Journal of Psychiatry. We have been highly successful in this regard. Acceptance for indexing was accomplished, with the help of Wiley, within the first two years of our application, and now we rank in the *second quartile* for the second year in a row. This is especially meaningful given the young age of our journal and the fact that we ranked in the lowest quartile for some years after our inception.

**2** The Asian Federation of Psychiatric Associations (AFPA) was being formed around the same time our journal was being established. At that time both the PRCP and AFPA Boards supported my initiative to include AFPA as a sponsoring organization. While AFPA leadership was enthusiastic and participated in the initial planning for almost two years, just before we were to sign the contract with Wiley, now Wiley/Blackwell, they decided to form their own journal. After some years, however, that journal failed, and the then president of AFPA approached me about our becoming the official journal of AFPA. After several years of discussions and negotiations, and important support from Wiley/Blackwell, we were able to agree that Asia Pacific Psychiatry\_would become not only the official journal of both PRCP and AFPA fulfilling our original aim. While more work needs to be done to fully implement the collaboration, I have no doubt this can occur, fostering an enhanced scope and quality of the journal.

**3** The impact of the COVID pandemic has adversely affected both the quantity and quality of submissions to many journals. For example, an extremely well regarded international journal, which is a monthly publication, last year received only about the same number of submissions as our journal, which is ,as you know, a quarterly publication. Even with the pandemic effect, our percentage of submissions accepted for publication has continued to stay at a very low level, less than 10% last year, which means we are very competitive. This trend has continued to evolve in this desirable direction over the course of my editorship leading to the improvement in our indexing level.

**4** The original contract, which I negotiated with Wiley, had two very important components in addition to the usual agreements for collaboration. First, we agreed there would be no cost to PRCP for publishing the journal, an unusual contract term. Further, the contract called for a return of profits to the PRCP. These terms are not typical, especially when there is no publication charge, and continue to bring in a meaningful revenue stream to PRCP.



**5** Our readership and submissions sources reflect a diverse array of countries from all over the world. This includes countries well beyond the initial focus of the journal, which essentially included only the countries of original focus of PRCP. This expansion reflects the increasing awareness of the journal as an important source of psychiatric knowledge. This perception of the journal is also reflected by the fact that I was approached by external organizations asking us to sponsor several special issues of the journal. Recent important topics for such issues have been suicide prevention, from the World Federation for Mental Health, and child and adolescent psychiatry, from the World Psychiatric Association. We also have been asked to publish abstracts or articles for special issues based on annual congresses from national or regional psychiatric associations.

To conclude, my sincere appreciation and thanks go to the large number of our own members and others who have served as members of the editorial board and reviewers of submissions. Their work has ensured the ongoing increase in the journal's quality. I leave my position as Editor in Chief with a sense of fulfillment and satisfaction, knowing that a strong foundation for ongoing success and growth has been well established.
